Thank you for your interest in the work of the Institute of East Asian Studies (IN-EAST) at the University of Duisburg-Essen. In this 27th annual report we outline major developments and provide an overview of teaching, research and policy advisory work conducted at the IN-EAST between October 2019 and September 2020.

The recent months have been overshadowed and substantially determined by the outbreak of the Corona pandemic. Virtually all of our study abroad programs, fieldwork activities in East Asia as well as physical meetings at conferences and academic meetings all over the world have had to be terminated, postponed or shifted to innovative digital formats. Monographs are important research publications in area studies. They give context and allow analyses of often


complex phenomena in East Asia from an interdisciplinary perspective.

Nele Noesselt and Christof Hartmann (Eds.):

China's New Role in African Politics. From Non-Intervention towards Stabilization? London and New York: Routledge, November 2019, 256 pp.

China's rise to global power status in recent decades has been accompanied by deepening economic relationships with Africa, with the New Silk Road's extension to Sub-Saharan Africa as the latest step, leading to much academic debate about the influence of Chinese business in the continent. However, China's engagement with African states at the political and diplomatic level has received less attention in the literature. This book investigates the impact of Chinese policies on African politics, asking how China deals with political instability in Africa and, in turn, how Af-

icans perceive China to be helping or hindering political stability. China officially operates with a foreign-policy strategy that conceives of Africa as one integrated, monolithic area (with the Forum on China-Africa Cooperation the flagship of intercontinental cooperation). However, this book highlights the plurality of context-specific interaction patterns between Chinese and African elites, demonstrating how China's role and relevance has evolved differently according to whether African countries are resource-rich and geostrategically important from



the Chinese perspective. By looking comparatively at a range of different country cases, this book aims to promote a more thorough understanding of how China reacts to political stability and instability, and how it contributes to domestic political dynamics and stability within African states.

Werner Pascha, Patrick Köllner and Aurel Croissant:

Japan Report. Sustainable Governance Indicators 2020.
Gütersloh: Bertelsmann-Stiftung, 2019, 59 pp.

Despite a rapidly ageing population and alarmingly high levels of public debt, Japan remains one of the world's leading economies; its per-capita economic growth rate is in line with that of the United States and the European Union. However, disposable incomes have risen little in recent years, and real per-capita consumption has been flat. In a country once hailed as the epitome of equitable growth, a new precariat has emerged, with some 40 per cent of the labour force in non-regular employment. Since gaining power in late 2012, the Abe government has pursued two major policy goals: seeking to achieve a robust economic upturn and to effect the first ever change to Japan's post-

war constitution. The initial economic stimulus programme of 2013 ('Abenomics') included an aggressive course of monetary easing and additional deficit spending. Since 2015, the policy focus on strengthening the economy, expanding childcare and improving the social security programme has further deflected attention from structural reforms. Meanwhile, old-age poverty and the instability of jobs, especially among young people, remain pressing issues. Constitutional reform – the government's second major priority – remains unpopular. In the 2019 upper house election, the Liberal Democratic Party-led coalition lost its two-thirds majority (although it retains this supermajority



in the lower house). A traditional bulwark of liberal democracy in East Asia, Japan has become overshadowed in this regard by Taiwan, and perhaps even South Korea.


Shuanping Dai and Markus Taube (Eds.):*China's Quest for Innovation. Institutions and Ecosystems.*

London: Routledge, 2019, 304 pp.

The transition from a catching-up-style economy to an innovation-driven economy poses a major challenge for China. This book examines the major issues at stake, outlines developments in crucial business fields and industries, and discusses the roles of top-down politics and bottom-up entrepreneurship. It focuses particularly on the institutional foundations of innovation, arguing that successful innovation relies on the favourable interplay of business, politics and society, and that

comprehensive institutional and organisational changes will be required in China for innovation to succeed. Overall, the book assesses how far China will be able to depart from the Western paradigm of successful innovation regimes and create its own innovation system with Chinese characteristics.



**Yuan Li and Markus Taube (Eds.):***How China's Silk Road Initiative is Changing the Global Economic Landscape.*

London: Routledge 2019, 304 pp.


China's New Silk Road initiative constitutes one of the most ambitious projects in recent decades designed to change the pattern of the global economic division of labour, as well as the geostrategic balance of power. It has the potential to create a new fabric of industrial value creation that links China and East Asia with Europe, via Central and South Asia, and to forge new regional and multilateral institutions that complement or compete with existing regional and global governance systems. First proposed in 2013, the new initiative is only now starting to be

rolled out, with trade relations gradually intensifying and the first investment projects and infrastructure clusters becoming manifest. However, the full impact of the evolving new regional value chains on global goods flows, investment activity and supranational institution building, as well as their wider international implications, remains undetermined. This book brings together leading scholars from economics, political science and area studies, who present the latest cutting-edge knowledge and state-of-the-art economic and political analysis of how the new



initiative is developing – and is likely to develop.

**Florian Coulmas and Judith Stalpers: *Japan in 101 vragen [Japan in 101 Questions]*.**



Florian Coulmas:*Das Zeitalter der Identität. Kritische Überlegungen zu einem Schlüsselbegriff unserer Zeit.* Heidelberg: Universitätsverlag Winter, 2019, 267 Seiten.

„Identität“ ist etwas, das der Erklärung bedarf und das zur Erklärung herangezogen wird. Diejenigen, die den Begriff verwenden, scheinen zu wissen, was sie damit meinen, sind sich aber sicher nicht immer bewusst, dass andere etwa anderes damit meinen. Es ist ein Modewort, aber nicht nur ein solches. Dafür hat es sich zu lange gehalten. Es indiziert vielmehr individuelle und kollektive Befindlichkeiten unserer Zeit, die auf vielfältige Weise zum Ausdruck kommen. Dieses Buch stellt die wich-

tigsten Aspekte von Identität dar und zeigt, wo es Überschneidungen und Unterschiede gibt. 

Giulia Romano:*Changing Urban Renewal Policies in China. Policy Transfer and Policy Learning under Multiple Hierarchies.* Basel: Palgrave Macmillan 2020, 245 pp.


This book explores careful urban renewal, a concept that originated in Berlin in the 1980s and was proposed to Yangzhou, a city in the wealthy Chinese province of Jiangsu, in the early 2000s. It sets out to understand whether knowledge and ideas originating in a specific setting can be transferred to another locality thousands of miles away and change the policies and practices of the destination city. The book

shows that foreign ideas can inspire ambitious policy reforms in a single city, but that multiple challenges also exist to policy learning and to rooting new ideas in local practices. To explore these challenges, this book develops an analysis of the microdynamics of policy transfer and shows there are multiple hierarchies that a Chinese city can be subjected to, intermittently opening or closing ‘windows for policy learning’.

Zürich: Orell Füssli Verlag, Februar 2020, 112 Seiten.

Vom Recht des „So sein zu dürfen, wie man ist“ und anders zu sein als die Anderen, sind wir alle zufirst überzeugt. Der Anspruch auf die eigene Identität ist einfach überall: auf Instagram, Facebook, YouTube, bei der Kleidungswahl und Musikvorlieben, in der Politik und bei der Wahl der Nahrungsmittel. Doch wenn alle von Identität sprechen, was ist damit eigentlich gemeint? Die Antwort ist gar nicht so leicht, denn Identität ist eben vielfältig: die der Flüchtlinge und die des Abendländs-

die der Nation und der Deutschen, die der Rechtsordnung, der SPD, unserer Wurzeln, des Stadtzentrums, der Landschaft, der Katalanen, der Nationalmannschaft usw. Identität ist zu einem allseits verwendbaren Begriff geworden, der für vieles herhalten muss, auf individueller wie auf kollektiver Ebene. Das Buch zu einem Begriff, der unser Denken und Fühlen bestimmt und längst zur Leit- und Streitfrage der Politik geworden ist.

Thomas Heberer und Armin Müller:

Entwicklungsstaat China. Politik, Wirtschaft, sozialer Zusammenhalt und Ideologie. Studie im Auftrag der Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung. Berlin, März 2020, 60 Seiten.

Die Studie hat zum Ziel, die aktuellen Entwicklungen in Politik, Wirtschaft, Ideologie und Gesellschaft einzuordnen. Die Autoren stützen ihre Konzeptualisierung der Funktion und Funktionsweise des chinesischen Staates auf das Konzept des „Entwicklungsstaates“ und das chinesische Selbstverständnis als „Disziplinierungsstaat“. Zentral ist dabei die Ergänzung durch Elemente der politischen Kultur und Geschichte, um die dem politischen System zugrundeliegende Logik zu erklären. Die Autoren verwenden dazu drei Beispiele: den Staat als Moralstaat, die Antikorruptionskampagne und das „Sozialkreditsystem“. Sie erläutern auch, weshalb große Teile der Bevölkerung dieses System akzeptieren und verdeutlichen die „Pfadabhängigkeit“ von Überwachungssystemen als Teil der politischen Geschichte Chinas. Dies steht in Zusammenhang mit aktuellen ideologischen Entwicklungen, Wertvorstellungen und den Diskursen über


neue „chinesische“ bzw. „sozialistische“ Werte. Auch hier erfolgt ein Rückgriff auf die Geschichte Chinas, um die Konfuzianismus-Debatte, den Diskurs über das traditionelle Ordnungssystem tianxia sowie die Diskussion über den „konfuzianischen“ Unternehmer einzurichten. Als Motor der chinesischen Entwicklung spielen Privatwirtschaft und Unternehmertum nach wie vor eine zentrale Rolle. Die Autoren beleuchten den Einfluss von Unternehmerinnen und Unternehmern auf die Politikgestaltung und ihr Kollektivverhalten, das dieser Politik zugrundeliegt. Schließlich untersucht die Studie die chinesische Sozial- und Bildungspolitik. China profitierte von der elitenfeindlichen, auf eine breite Grundversorgung ausgerichteten Politik im Maoismus. Eine gesunde, alphabetisierte, aber auch arme Bevölkerung war eine wichtige Grundlage des Wirtschaftsbooms der Reformperiode. Die Sozialpolitik entspricht entwicklungsstaatl-

**Thomas Heberer and Gunter Schubert:**

Weapons of the Rich. Strategic Action of Private Entrepreneurs in Contemporary China. New Jersey: World Scientific, May 2020, 276 pp.

This book provides a fresh perspective on the political agency of private entrepreneurs in contemporary China. Most Chinese scholarship describes this group as politically acquiescent due to systematic co-optation by the party state. This book, however, argues that private entrepreneurs should be understood – and analytically conceptualised – as a 'strategic group' that uses different formal and informal channels to safeguard and expand its interests, though so far it has not challenged the current regime. State-business relations in contemporary China should


thus be understood not in terms of mere clientelism but as a dynamic symbiosis in which private entrepreneurs contribute substantially to policy and institutional change. This book is based on several years of comparative empirical fieldwork across China. With its rich and unique qualitative data and insights, it contributes significantly to our understanding of the political behaviour and impact of private entrepreneurs in contemporary China.

**Zi Wang:**

The Discursive Construction of Hierarchy in Japanese Society. An Ethnographic Study of Secondary School Clubs. Boston and Berlin: Walter De Gruyter, 2020, 214 pp.

Seniority-based hierarchy (*jouge kankei*) is omnipresent in Japanese group dynamics. How one comports depends on one's status and position vis-à-vis others. To-date, no study has shown what constitutes this hierarchy, where and when individuals growing up in Japan first come into contact with it or how they learn to function within it. This book fills in the lacunae. Considering *jouge kankei* as a social institution and adopting a discourse-analytic approach, it examines how institutional *jouge kankei*, as an enduring feature of Japanese social life, is created and re-

produced. The monograph analyses how social actors enact, legitimise, transmit and reify seniority-based relations through language use and paralinguistic discursive practices, such as the use of space, objects, signs and symbols. It also looks at how established rules could be challenged. The empirical data on which findings are based were gathered through 10 months of ethnographic fieldwork in Japanese schools between 2015 and 2018, with certain types of data (school-club etiquette books and uniforms) being presented and analysed for the first




time. This volume also shows continuity and change in *jouge kankei* from school to the workplace.

Thomas Heberer:

Ostpreußen und China. Nachzeichnung einer wundersamen Beziehung. Prussia-Schriftenreihe Nr. 53. Husum: Husum Verlag, 2020, 204 Seiten.

Über die ehemalige deutsche Provinz Ostpreußen ist viel geschrieben worden. Die Darstellung der Geschichte der Außenbeziehungen Ostpreußens mit dem fernen China ist jedoch ein Novum. Den inhaltlichen Zugang eröffnet Thomas Heberer auf biographische Weise über seine eigene ostpreußische Familiengeschichte und seinen beruflichen Hintergrund. Der renommierte Chinawissenschaftler entwirft daraufhin ein vielseitiges Bild des „wundersamen“ Beziehungsgeflechts unter Betrachtung von geschichtlichen, politischen, künstlerischen oder erinnerungskulti-

uellen Aspekten. Dazu gehören Themen vom Chinabezug Friedrichs des Großen über die Chinoiserien in den „ostpreußischen Königsschlössern“ bis hin zur Katastrophe des Nationalsozialismus. Thomas Heberer interessieren vor allem auch die vielen „Erinnerungsfiguren“ des ostpreußisch-chinesischen Beziehungsgefüges. Zu den vorgestellten Persönlichkeiten gehören beispielweise geistige „Giganten“ wie die Philosophen Kant und Herder oder die Literaten Kleist und Thomas Mann. Dieses Buch verdeutlicht, dass Ostpreußen keineswegs „hinterwäldlerisch“



war, sondern eine große Zahl weltoffener, kreativer und gelehrter Männer und Frauen hervorgebracht hat, die weltweite Bedeutung erlangten.

Michael Grömling und Markus Taube (Hrsg.):

Reflexionen zur Sozialen Marktwirtschaft. Eine Festschrift für Wolfgang Quässer. Marburg: Metropolis, Juli 2020, 399 Seiten.

Die Soziale Marktwirtschaft stellt einen zentralen Eckpfeiler der deutschen Gesellschaftsordnung dar. Sie steht für eine demokratische Grundordnung, wirtschaftliche Dynamik und sozialen Ausgleich. Die nach dem Zweiten Weltkrieg erstmalig in Deutschland konzi-

pierte und sehr erfolgreich implementierte Soziale Marktwirtschaft ist aber kein starres Konstrukt, sondern hat sich im Verlauf der Jahrzehnte in nicht unerheblichem Maße gewandelt, neue Schwerpunkte gesetzt, gesellschaftliche und technologische Veränderun-

metropolis

gen zu akkommodieren versucht. Die Soziale Marktwirtschaft ist von daher keine stabile Errungenschaft, sondern muss immer wieder von neuem mit Leben erfüllt werden. In dem vorliegen-

den Band werden diese Prozesse und anstehenden Herausforderungen aus unterschiedlichen Perspektiven, mit unterschiedlichem normativem Grundverständnis und aus unterschiedlichen

akademischen Disziplinen reflektiert. Dabei wird auch erörtert, welche Strahlkraft die Soziale Marktwirtschaft über die Grenzen Deutschlands hinaus entfaltet.

Thomas Heberer:

Disciplining of a Society. Social Disciplining and Civilizing Processes in Contemporary China.

Cambridge (MA): Ash Center for Democratic Governance and Innovation, Kennedy School, Harvard University, August 2020, 90 pp.

In this paper, we specifically focus on the social disciplining process in China since 2012 – that is, in the Xi Jinping era – although we also briefly touch on historical aspects of such disciplining, including in Confucianism, Legalism, the 'New Life Movement' in the Mao-era political campaigns of the 1930s, and so on. The approach adopted is an analysis of the state's disciplining/civilising top-down project. We argue that the function of the current Chinese state, as a disciplining and civilising entity, is the connecting link that connects policies – such as the state's morality policies, anti-corruption drive and so-called 'social credit system' – together under a specific governance logic: to discipline and civilise society in order to prepare the people to become mod-

ernised. In fact, modernisation and modernity encompass not only a process of economic and political-administrative modernising but also – and concurrently – one related to the organisation of society in general, and the disciplining of this society and its individuals to create people with 'modernised' minds in particular. Our principal research questions are twofold: (1) How should disciplining and civilising processes in general, and in contemporary China in particular, be understood?; and (2) What kind of policies and tools does the Chinese state use to pursue and implement its disciplining objectives? This paper thus contributes to understandings of the logic and rationality of China's political system, its developmental goals and its disciplining and mod-



ernising trajectories. In this way, it also enhances our knowledge of comparative modernising processes and multiple modernities.


Markus Taube and Cornelia Storz (Eds.):

Firms, Institutions, and the State in East Asia. A Festschrift in Honour of Werner Pascha.

Economic Studies on Asia, Vol. 16. Marburg: Metropolis, 2020, 437 pp.

During the last couple of decades, Japan, Korea and China have undergone a highly dynamic process of economic development, which enabled them to occupy highly influential positions in the global community. Globalisation had been one of the key drivers of East Asia's rise, but East Asia also eventually became a key force for the evolution of ever-more-complex global value chains, as well as a highly interdependent global economic system. In the early years of the 21st century, however – when a global decoupling, rather than increasing globalisation, appears

to have become the paradigm of the day – East Asian countries need to redefine their role in the global system, recalibrate their societal models and adjust their socioeconomic development structures appropriately. This *Festschrift* brings together a selected group of world-renowned scholars committed to the analysis of contemporary socioeconomic developments in East Asia and the changing roles and attributes of firms, institutions and the state there. Their contributions provide a kaleidoscope of insights from various disciplines into how these develop-



ments unfold, what development trends are being set up and how these may affect European interests – and the global system as a whole.



Lisa Bachmann then hosted a short talk show with students who had returned from East Asia. **Anne Herr** (Fukuoka University), **Philipp Hollmann** (Kobe City University), **Dicle Alak** (Wuhan University) and **Erik Rien** (Wuhan University) talked about their student life in Japan and China. **Nele Noesselt** then welcomed the new MA students to our institute.

Next, **Dirk Petzold** – head of IN-EAST's alumni association, AlFreDO e.V. – presented the activities of the organisation and talked about the career opportunities that await graduates from East Asian study programmes. He also announced the AlFreDO-funded *Deutschlandstipendium*, which was awarded to **Davide Viero** (MA CEAS). UDE scholarships were awarded to **Dennis Arabadzhiev**, **Hannah Grüttgen** and **Kuat Sultanbekov**. Finally, Dirk Petzold also announced the winner of the

AlFreDO Best Thesis Award: **Andrew Devine**, for his Master's thesis *Authoritarian Resilience and the Evolution of Chinese Internet Governance* (supervised by Prof. Nele Noesselt).

The highlight of the evening, however, was the graduation ceremony. Each graduate student entered the stage and received their Bachelor's or Master's certificate. All graduates – as well as some of the PhD scholars who completed their dissertations this year – then assembled onstage for a group photo, throwing their mortarboards. Alessia Zaffaroni, an MA Contemporary East Asian Studies student, is among the award winners of the Sparkassenpreis 2019 for outstanding students and *summa cum laude* doctoral candidates of the University of Duisburg-Essen.

On **November 11, 2019**, the Sparkasse Duisburg presented these awards to selected students and doctoral candidates of the UDE. Alessia Zaffaroni, who was in Japan at the time for an in-

5 AUSSTELLUNG CHINA MIGRANT

FOTOS UND FILME VON DANIEL TRAUB

Am **6. November 2019** hat das IN-EAST die neue Ausstellung *China Migrant* in seinen Räumlichkeiten eröffnet. Sie dokumentiert die gesellschaftlichen, ökonomischen und kulturellen Veränderungen und Umbrüche, die seit Beginn der Öffnungs- und Reformpolitik in der Volksrepublik China durch Arbeitsmigration sichtbar geworden sind. Im Mittelpunkt steht das dokumentarische Werk des chinesisch-US-amerikanischen Fotografen und Filmemachers **Daniel Traub**, der die Lebensbedingungen von Arbeitsmigrant/innen in China über einen Zeitraum von zwei Jahrzehnten mit seiner Kamera eingefangen hat. Die Ausstellung versammelt Werke aus einzelnen Foto- und Dokumentarfilmprojekten des Künstlers, um eine facettenreiche Gesamtschau auf interne und externe Migration in China zu bieten. Porträt-, Stadt- und Land(schafts-)aufnahmen aus der Fotoserie *China Migrant* (2005–2007) beleuchten vielfältige Aspekte der Binnenmigration von


Wanderarbeiter/innen innerhalb Chinas, darunter die Situation in den ostchinesischen Küstenstädten sowie in den Rand- und Übergangszonen zwischen ländlichem und städtischem Raum. In Kombination mit eigenen Kurzfilmen des Künstlers dokumentiert das kollaborative Fotoprojekt *Little North Road* (2009–2014) die afrikanische Arbeitsmigration in der aufstrebenden Wirtschaftsmetropole Guangzhou: Es zeigt von chinesischen Tourismusfotograf/innen als Wanderarbeiter/innen aufgenommene Porträts afrikanischer Arbeitsmigrant/innen (einschließlich Berufs- und Privatreisender) und präsentiert damit eine Art Passagenwerk zwischen Binnenmigration und externer Migration.

Der Kurzfilm *Phoenix: Xu Bing* (2013) nähert sich dem Thema von einer künstlerisch-kritischen Perspektive, er setzt der ökonomischen Ausbeutung wandernder Bauarbeiter/innen ein symbolisches Mahnmal.

Ziel der Ausstellung ist es, anhand des foto- und filmdokumentarischen Werkes des Künstlers Daniel Traub ein umfassendes Bild von Migrationsprozessen in der chinesischen Gesellschaft zu vermitteln.

6 TRAVELLING CONFERENCES ON URBAN TRANSFORMATIONS IN INDUSTRIAL REGIONS

Travelling Conferences (TCs) are a format designed to promote and foster international exchange about specific current issues. More precisely, given the significant interest in questions of current urban transformation and comparable challenges in many metropolitan regions around the world (e.g. post-industrial transformation, demographic change, urban strategies of climate-change mitigation and adaptation, waterfront development) – as well as in how policies, strategies and blueprints for such transformations are exchanged globally (e.g. research on policy diffusion, policy mobility and travelling concepts) –, this series of TCs aims to combine a theoretical and conceptual approach with an empirical section on selected current policies. To accomplish this goal, a number of presentations will be given at each conference, supplemented by panel and roundtable discussions.



To prepare the first conferences, German participants convened for an initial meeting at the IN-EAST School of Advanced Studies in Duisburg on **October 22, 2019**. The series of conferences started on **November 18–19, 2019** in Osaka and on **November 21–22** in Ulsan. Representatives of the Ruhr region and the University Alliance Ruhr in Germany (which organise the conference series) attended, accompanied by members from institutions in the partner regions, as well as **Markus Taube** and **Katharina Borgmann** from IN-EAST. Further workshops will take place in Essen and Cincinnati in 2021 (due to the Covid-19 pandemic), again attended by these representatives.

7 NEW DIRECTIONS IN LABOUR MIGRATION IN EUROPE AND ASIA-PACIFIC

Young researchers and experts on migration got together at a workshop on **December 11, 2020** at the University of Duisburg-Essen. The workshop was organized by IN-EAST researcher **Karen Shire** and GRK 1613 doctoral graduate **Aimi Muranaka**, in cooperation with **Gracia Liu-Farrer** (Waseda University, Tokyo) and **Hirohisa Takenoshita** (Keio University, Tokyo). This event was funded by a German Research Foundation grant provided to Karen Shire (Grant

SH 82-8-1) to promote international co-operation for the development of inter-regional comparative perspectives on cross-border labour markets and labour migration in Japan and Germany. Junior and senior scholars from Japan and Germany were invited to this workshop. Participants presented their research projects, which covered issues of intra-/interregional and cross-border migrations in both Europe and Asia.



8 ADVENTSABEND ZU DONALD J. TRUMP UND ZUM STAND DER „U.S. POLITICS“

Axel Klein (IN-EAST), Philipp Adorf (Uni Bonn) und Betsy Leimbiger (FU Berlin) luden am **17. Dezember 2019** in den großen Hörsaal des Audimax auf dem Campus Duisburg ein. Die Schlaglichter, die behandelt wurden, beinhalteten u.a. die Amtsführung des Präsidenten („I can be the most presidential person ever, other than possibly the great Abe Lincoln, alright?“), seine Kommunikationsweise und „colorful language“, den politisierten Obersten Gerichtshof, und

das umstrittene Politikfeld der Krankenversicherung, in dem Herr Trump zu Beginn seiner Amtszeit Reformen versprochen hatte „that expand choice, increase access, lower costs, and at the same time provide better health care.“ Der Präsident kam auch selbst zu Wort, in Video-Clips und einigen seiner Tweets, und lieferte so weitere Puzzleteile zum gegenwärtigen Stand der Dinge in „U.S. politics“.



9 LECTURE SERIES BY THOMAS HEBERER

VORTRAGSREIHE VON THOMAS HEBERER

Prof. Thomas Heberer has been involved with China in both an academic and a professional capacity over the past 40 years, during which he has accumulated a wealth of research experience. In five individual lectures during the winter term of 2019/20, he shared his profound knowledge of research on and fieldwork in China. The session topics covered a number of pressing issues faced by China and the world, focusing on Thomas Heberer's fieldwork methods and research results throughout his career. All participants profited greatly from his expertise in empirically grounded and theory-driven research, and enjoyed a fruitful exchange of ideas in the discussion part of each session.

Zwei IN-EAST-Studenten haben beim Internationalen Sprachwettbewerb *Chinese Bridge*, der von den Konfuzius-Instituten organisiert wird, am **13. Juni 2020** im Deutschlandfinale erfolgreich abgeschnitten: **Daniel Rakewitsch** wurde Sieger, **Lara Gruber** kam auf den 2. Platz. Der Wettbewerb war als Zoom-Webinar durchgeführt worden. Der Wettbewerb bestand aus drei Teilen: Es galt einen Vortrag zu halten, Fragen über Landeskunde, Geschichte und Kultur Chinas zu beantworten sowie eine künstlerische Darbietung zum Besten zu geben. Daniel Rakewitsch

sprach über „Die ganze Welt als eine Familie“. Er beschäftigte sich in dem Vortrag mit unterschiedlichen Esskulturen, dem damit einhergehenden globalen Austausch und der Integration. 13 DIE BEZIEHUNGEN ZWISCHEN DER EU UND CHINA. HERAUSFORDERUNGEN – RISIKEN – CHANCEN

24. DUISBURGER OSTASIENTAG 2020

Am **19. Juni 2020** veranstaltete das IN-EAST seinen 24. Ostasientag, wegen der Corona-Epidemie als ZOOM-Konferenz.

In der zweiten Jahreshälfte 2020 hat Deutschland die EU-Ratspräsidentschaft übernommen. Viele der ursprünglich geplanten Inhalte und Ziele mussten angesichts der COVID-19-Pandemie zurückgestellt oder modifiziert werden. Einer der ursprünglich vorgesehenen Schwerpunkte hat aber noch zusätzliche Relevanz gewonnen: der EU-China-Gipfel, dieses Jahr nur di-

gital abgehalten, hatte große Fragen zu behandeln. Wie kann das bilaterale Verhältnis konstruktiv stabilisiert und gestärkt werden angesichts eines zerbrechenden Kräftedreiecks China–EU–USA, in ihren Grundfesten gefährdeter Demokratien und aufsteigender Autokraten, kollabierender Volkswirtschaften und einer sich in Nationalstrukturen auflösenden Weltwirtschaft. Europa und China hätten wichtige Impulse zur Bewältigung dieser Herausforderungen liefern können. Ein Scheitern des Gipfels wird aber auch zu einer

weiteren Verschärfung der Problemlage führen können. Nach Begrüßung der Teilnehmer und Vortrag eines Impuls-Statements durch **Nele Noesselt** vom IN-EAST diskutierte sie mit **Nicole Bastian** (Ressortleiterin Ausland, Handelsblatt), **Mikko Huotari** (Direktor des Mercator Institute for China Studies), **Petra Sig mund** (Leiterin der Abteilung Asien-Pazifik im Auswärtigen Amt) und **Volker Stanzel** (ehem. Botschafter in der VR China und in Japan, stellvert. Leiter der Gesellschaft für Außenpolitik).



14 COVID-19: 101 VOICES

DREI FRAGEN ZU DEN AUSWIRKUNGEN VON CORONA

Between mid-May and the end of June 2020, **Florian Coulmas** asked 101 participants (aged 11–90) from some 30 countries to answer three questions in one sentence each:

- What was the worst thing about the Covid-19 pandemic?
- What was the best thing about the Covid-19 pandemic?
- What is your hope for the future?

Their responses were extremely instructive, illustrating the truly global repercussions of the Covid-19 pandemic and, taken together, offering food for further thought.



The IN-EAST School of Advanced Studies on Innovation in East Asia is a BMBF-funded School of the IN-EAST from April 2013 until March 2017 (1st funding period), prolonged until March 2019 (2nd funding period). The second funding period has been extended until July 2020 to disseminate the results among scientific peers and public stakeholders.

The IN-EAST School of Advanced Studies' research agenda took the embeddedness of innovation processes in a society as a whole as its general focus of interest, with particular emphasis on the interdependent top-

ics of electromobility and urban systems. All research activities took East Asia (China, Japan, Korea) as the subject of their analysis, but provided interfaces for international comparisons and comparative research agendas. Innovation is understood as a social phenomenon which not only encompasses the technological dimension but which must also be embedded in specific 'social technologies' that create innovation-inducing environments and promote the diffusion of new technological solutions in the socio-economic system in order to succeed. The starting point for the research was therefore the transdisciplinary literature on the institutional foundations of national, regional, sectoral and technological innovation regimes. These specific institutions can be interpreted as 'capital goods' determining the productivity of individual and social innovation efforts. But as these embedding institutions exist in specific national cultures and follow different cultural, political and technological path dependencies, innovation in general must be understood as a process that is very much determined by national and cultural idiosyncrasies. Based on this understanding, we fostered systematic collaboration between different disciplines and area studies to generate significant advances in our knowledge of innovation in general and the parameters of national, regional, sectoral and technological competitiveness in particular.

The Advanced School was organized in 6 junior research groups of 2 doctoral students guided by a postdoc or Junior Professor. After undergoing successful evaluation process by peers the IN-EAST School of Advanced Studies was extended for a second funding period until December 2019 to continue its research. The interdisciplinary perspective on innovation was further strengthened and the institutional transfers beyond national borders have been scrutinized. The junior research groups transformed into postdoc research groups. In its second funding phase the IN-EAST School

consists of 1 Junior Professor, **Shuiping Dai**, and 6 Postdocs, **Katharina Borgmann**, **Beate Löffler**, **Giulia Romano**, **Mira Schüller**, **Deirdre Sneep**, and, temporarily, **Mahmood Shubbak**. They worked as a joint interdisciplinary research team on innovation in East Asia converged on electric mobility and urban systems with main research focus on institutional transplants.

The details of the research program can be accessed via the website of the project (<https://www.uni-due.de/in-east/research/school.php>). Research results have been presented to the scientific community on the final conferences at the German Japanese Centre in Berlin in May 2019.

As transfer project to disseminate the results to the scientific community as well as to other stakeholders (from urban planning, administration, regional development organizations, politics) a series of Travelling Conferences was organized for 2019 and 2020 with a focus on innovation in urban systems being confronted with the need of restructuring. For this purpose the concept of travelling conferences was refined and conferences in areas undergoing structural change have been planned. The focus was put on urban transformation of industrial regions. For this series of travelling conferences the IN-EAST School joined forces with the "Competence Field Metropolitan Research" of the University Alliance Ruhr comprising of researchers of the Ruhr University Bochum, the Technical University Dortmund and the University of Duisburg-Essen.

Travelling Conferences (TCs) are a format designed to promote and foster international exchange about specific current issues. More specifically, given the significant interest in questions of current urban transformation and comparable challenges in many metropolitan regions around the world (e.g. post-industrial transformation, demographic change, urban strategies of climate change mitigation and adaptation, waterfront development) as well as an interest in the ways in which policies, strategies, blueprints for such transformations are exchanged globally (e.g. research on policy diffusion, policy mobility, travelling concepts), this series of TCs combine a theoretical and conceptual approach along with an empirical section on selected current policies. To accomplish this goal, a number of presentations given at each conference are supplemented by panel and round-table discussions.

Together with local actors conferences were planned in Osaka, Ulsan, Cincinnati, and in the Emscher Region in Essen as final conference. After a successful start in Japan and Korea (cf. the conference programmes on pp. 62–63) the Covid-19 pandemic forced a postponement. The IN-EAST and the Competence Field Metropolitan Research together with its partners, the Emschergenossenschaft in Essen and the University of Cincinnati the IN-EAST plans to carry out these conferences after the end of the pandemic.

Although the IN-EAST School of Advanced Studies came to end with expiration of the generous grants of the Ministry of Education and Research in July 2020 many of its members continue to analyze the rich empirical findings and to further develop the analytical concepts. To keep you informed about these results we will update the website of the project regularly.

Joint Projects: HELLP

In spring 2020, AREA Ruhr started its MERCUR-funded Hybrid East Asian Language Learning Program (in short HELLP) which is conducted in corporation with the Landes-spracheninstitut (LSI) at Ruhr University Bochum. HELLP aims at developing sophisticated digital material to improve the level of individualized learning opportunities within the language courses at the IN-EAST and OAW/RUB. FLEMMING CHRISTIANSEN

China's Urbanisation Processes and the Emergence of New Political and Social Structures in China.

Current research

Explorations of how new-style communities (*shequ*, i.e. local-level residential areas of public-policy provisioning) emerge in a medium-sized city in central China. The empirical research examines, in the first instance, how communities cater for the social transitions of peri-urban rural people relocated into urban settings and also seeks to capture the broad variety of interests, purposes and administrative logics that determine their structure and path of development. This research topic is driven by an interest in explaining how social developments in China reflect coherent systemic logics. Broader research interests include the Chinese in the global economy, whereby the ethnic Chinese workers overseas are regarded as part of the same "supply chains" as migrant workers in China. This research seeks to understand how forms of social and ethnic exclusion are framed in different contexts, reflecting pressures from the global economy.

FLEMMING CHRISTIANSEN

The Frontier of Industrialization in Continental North-East Asia

Current research

The research focuses on the frontier between "empires" in Northeast Asia as the site of industrialization processes since the 1890 up till today. The project is a joint effort with colleagues working in Sociology and History to develop common themes for possible third-party funding.

FLEMMING CHRISTIANSEN

Ideology and China

Current research

The research applies theories of ideology to an understanding of the political sociology of China as well as to non-Chinese views of Chinese civilization.

FLORIAN COULMAS AND ZI WANG

Language, Migration and Happiness: A Comparative Study of Subjective Well-Being across Three Communities in Germany

Funded by German Research Foundation (DFG, AOBJ 647584), 2018–2021

Does using one's native language in a foreign environment contribute to happiness? This is the overarching question this project is designed to address. The impact of many other social variables – marital status, religion, employment, income, leisure, quality of governance, education, among others – on happiness has been investigated empirically, but not language. The focus of this three-community comparative study is on what relationship exists between language maintenance and happiness for minority communities of diverse profiles and backgrounds for their residence in Germany. It will help us to gain a more comprehensive understanding of language as a social and individual variable. No similar study has been done before.

The three communities to be investigated are the Turkish, Chinese, and Japanese communities in Germany. We acknowledge that each community is heterogeneous in its own right in terms of geographical origins, backgrounds of residents, and motives of residing in Germany. However, in spite of the internal diversity, as communities they still differ markedly from each other with regard to their history of settlement in Germany and characteristic socio-economic profiles (see below for details). As we will show, such contrasting trajectories and backgrounds of the three selected groups, as well as the difference in extent to which scholarship on them is developed, facilitate the formulation of our pilot study questions and subsequent hypothesising, data collection, and ultimately the development of new theories on SWB and language maintenance among migrant groups.

Trust in Open Innovation

Opening research and development may combine the individual knowledge of contracting partners and enhance innovation efficiency, but may danger them in being cheated by partners due to the reasons of such as incomplete contracts, defective behavior. Nevertheless, the potential risk does not prevent firms from cooperation, and open innovation prevails widely in business. This project investigates how the contracting partners evaluate the trustworthiness and make open innovation investment decisions using a lab experimental approach.

THOMAS HEBERER

New Political Representative Claims: A Global View – France, Germany, Brazil, China, India

A French-German Joint Cooperation Project funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG) and the French L'Agence Nationale de la Recherche (ANR), 2016–2020.

The leading scientists in this research endeavor are Prof. Dr. Thomas Heberer (University of Duisburg-Essen) and Prof. Dr. Brigitte Geißel (Goethe University Frankfurt), as well as Prof. Yves Sintomer (Centre de Recherches Sociologiques et Politiques de Paris, CRESPPA) and Prof. Stéphanie Tawa Lama-Rewal (Centre d'Etudes de l'Inde et de l'Asie du Sud, CNRS-EHESS, Paris).

Europe currently experiences a crisis of established forms of political representation, visible for example in increasing political distrust. Various claims to renew political representation are emerging all over the world. However, most contemporary research on representation focuses on electoral/mandate representation within single countries. As a result, we lack a comparative, global analysis of (new) representative claims developed outside the representative political system; and dynamics developing in the Global South, including non-democratic entities, are neglected by Western scholars. Our research intended to address these gaps by putting into perspective representative claims in France and Germany – two leading democracies in Europe actively experimenting with new concepts of representation –, and in three BRICS states: Brazil – the largest democracy in Latin America with innovative participatory devices including competing representative claims –, India – the world's largest democracy and a pioneer in electoral quotas (as a claim for descriptive representation) –, and China – an authoritarian regime engaged in a huge transformation with specific representative claims.

Building on German and French political theories, our conceptual framework departed from standard ways of considering political representation in the context of electoral and mandate claims (e.g. Pitkin). We argued that while mandate representation remains important, it fails to account for crucial contemporary developments. Our premise is that political representation is increasingly related to the (re)emergence of new representative claims, i.e. situations in which an actor claims to speak/act in the name of others. Such claims are most often based on the denunciation of misrepresentation, which they pretend to correct.

However, in spite of the increasing variety of representative claims around the world, a comprehensive conceptual framework and a typology allowing a deeper understanding of these claims are missing and we addressed this conceptual gap.

In the five countries under scrutiny, we identified different situations in which (seemingly) new representative claims were raised, criticized or justified. Proceeding through a carefully designed common methodological framework, our research pursued the objective of analyzing developments of representative claims from a global, transnational perspective. To reach this objective we focused on two research fields. We analyzed: (1) Representative claims at the national level (national parliaments and media) raised during three national debates in each country; (2) Representative claims raised in three participatory devices at the sub-national level in each country. At both levels representative claims are justified with alleged misrepresentation of certain groups/ individuals within the given representative bodies. We rested on qualitative methods for data collection and applied the adjusted *Representative Claim Analysis* for data analyses. To scale up our findings, we followed the "case-thinking" approach, identify patterns of representative claims, developed a typology which can be applied for "terminological, classificatory and heuristic means" (Weber 1921), and theorized the findings in the context of modern democratic theory. The Duisburg team was responsible of the sub-project on China. It focused on the following policy fields: (a) Representation in authoritarian political entities; (b) Formal and informal patterns of representation and representative claims of private entrepreneurs, business organizations and formal and informal entrepreneurial networks; (c) Connective representation, i.e. new patterns of representation and representative claims by means of the cyberspace. Fieldwork in China was conducted in 2016 in Beijing, Hangzhou, Qingdao, Shenzhen, Haikou and Sanya (February–April), from February to April 2017 in Beijing, Guangzhou, Kunming, Cangyuan, Lincang, Mile, Jianshui, Mengzi, Xichang, Hangzhou and Qingdao, and in March and April 2018 in Beijing, Hangzhou, Wenzhou, Suzhou, Shanghai, Zhengzhou, Jiaozuo and Wenxian. In March 2019 we cooperated with the School of Public Affairs at Zhejiang University to host an international conference focusing on new and innovative forms of political representation at Zhejiang University in Hangzhou. Postdoctoral Research Fellow in this project is Dr. Anna Shpakovskaya (until Feb. 2020).

MOMOYO HÜSTEBECK

Innovative Forms of Democratic Participation: Deliberations in a Japanese and German Comparison

Funded by BMBF (Federal Ministry of Education and Research), No. 01UL 1828X, 09/2018–08/2021

As the principal investigator of the research project, Momoyo Hüstebeck scrutinizes the empirical impact of deliberative innovations on German and Japanese representative democracies. To counteract the widely lamented (partial) crisis of established democracies, political scientists have pursued more direct ways of citizens in institutional policy-making processes. In this context, deliberative methods provide a public opinion on a given political topic for a governmental policy-making.

The project investigates, based on normative theories of deliberative and participatory democracies against this background, whether new deliberative methods are effective responses to the democratic challenges. Among the vast number of European and some Japanese case studies of deliberative innovations, a research with a German-Japanese comparative approach is still lacking. Thus, the bi-national comparison shall reveal, how deliberative innovations are politically and socially embedded in the respective political system.

For Japan, mini-publics and the first national Deliberative Poll in 2012 serve as empirical cases. Mini-publics are the most widely spread deliberative method in Japan. Local governments implement mini-publics for citizens' voices concerning local long-term policies. In the Deliberative Poll, randomly selected citizens from all over Japan discussed and formed their opinions about Japan's future energy strategies after the nuclear accident.

Momoyo Hüstebeck was a guest fellow at the Waseda University and the DIJ in Tokyo in May 2019. She searched empirically for the functions of mini-publics in the local governance of Mitaka City and Shinjuku Ward. Moreover, she interviewed the organizers of the national Deliberative Poll about their intentions to implement it and their assessments of its political outcome.

AXEL KLEIN

Populism in Japan and East Asian Democracies

Awarded with a Research Fellowship by the Japanese Society for the Promotion of Science

This project focusses on populism in Japan. In the conceptually and empirically diverse body of literature the sheer existence of populism is contested as are its key components and consequently its definition. The phenomena labelled as Japanese manifestations of populism include a very diverse group of political actors that make it difficult to see a common conceptual ground. One finding most scholars agree upon, however, is that so far the case of Japan is almost non-existent in comparative efforts of the international political science community.

Supported by a research fellowship of the Japanese Society for the Promotion of Science, this project sets out to strengthen our understanding of populism in Japan, but it will also be the starting point of a broader endeavor. Hannes Mosler and Frédéric Krumbein will join in late 2020 with their expertise on South Korea and Taiwan, respectively, to approach populism in East Asian democracies from a comparative perspective.

YUAN LI

The Impact of New Silk Road Railways on Local Economic Development

Current research

One of the main focuses of the Belt and Road Initiative proposed by the Chinese government is connecting East Asia and Europe through multimodal transportation corridors. For the land route of the Belt and Road Initiative, the connection is mainly realized by railroads, especially through the China-Europe Express Railways. According to a recent development plan these railway lines will triple in the next few years. The research tries to provide the latest scientific evidence on the implications for a European city to open up a new railway link with China.

We use quasi-experimental methods to evaluate the impact of trans-continental rail connection on various economic outcomes by controlling for time-invariant, region-specific effects, as well as year-specific effects. We consider both geographical and spillover effects of the railways.

YUAN LI

Infrastructure Development and Inclusive Growth: Impact Evaluation, Transmission Mechanisms and the Role of Institutions

Current research

Achieving inclusive growth is a serious challenge faced by many governments and international development institutions who invest heavily in infrastructure. This challenge is particularly acute amid slowdown of the global economy and rising income inequality worldwide. However, researches on inclusive growth and the infrastructure-inclusive growth nexus are lagging behind. Even today, indicator(s) of inclusive growth is absent. Against this background, this project will (1) develop the first theoretical model that allows us to explain inclusive growth as a function of relevant drivers, including infrastructure variables; (2) propose a method to aggregate different kinds of infrastructures, build a comprehensive database on infrastructure projects, and measure the overall performance of infrastructure for different countries and at the sub-national level; (3) construct analytical frameworks, exploring the empirical relationship between inclusive growth and infrastructure, including the underlying transmission mechanisms; (4) emphasize the roles played by institutions and institutional quality in affecting inclusive growth, infrastructure development and the relationship between both; (5) derive policy implications and policy suggestions based on research findings and counter-factual analyses.

Travelling Knowledge: the Glocalization of Medical Professional Knowledge and Practice

Funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG), 2018–January 2021

The project contributes to globalization studies through an empirically grounded theory of the ways in which professional knowledge works across borders. Professions are seen as a third and globalizing form of regulation besides market and state since they govern themselves heterarchically through peer recognition of professional knowledge.

The project uses professional knowledge and practice of physicians as a test case for globalization studies. Medical knowledge is likely to universalize since it is based

on natural science evidence; many doctors are migrants and/or practice abroad, and the field has become more standardized. However, the national organization of health care and medical education, as well as the nature of the doctor-patient relationship, could also result in a boundedness of medical knowledge. We see medical knowledge both as universalizing through standard diffusion and as a situated response to socio-material problems, or, as Robertson (1992) suggests, as glocalized. Thus, we attempt to overcome clear-cut dichotomies between global and local, between universal and particular in the study of globalization.

The empirical study will focus on the treatment of a single cardiological condition in order to connect a macrosocial analysis of standard setting through transnational professional associations with the micro-social observation of situated professional knowledge and practice in treating this disease. By studying the global actor constellation that disseminates treatment standards we will trace processes of standard setting and diffusion that go beyond national cardiologic associations. By observing the treatment of simulated patients in medical pedagogical settings the project analyzes the ways in which standards inform tacit knowledge in practice. Observations at four university hospitals (Essen, Beijing, Maastricht/NL, Hacettepe/TR) maximize social and geographic distance.

The project delivers foundational research in the sociology of globalization based on a multi-method comparative study. On the basis of multiple embedded comparisons the project will show whether and to what extent knowledge universalizes through standard diffusion, shared contention and mobility. It also develops a more nuanced understanding of the ways in which professional knowledge remains particular and/or locally bound due to e.g. divergent standards, particular national health systems, epistemic and language communities, and position in migratory networks. Applied results of the project will aid the internationalization of medical education and improve cooperation between physicians in internationalized settings.

Dynamics of Chinese Social Policy: Interplay of National and International Influences Subject Classification

Funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG), 2018–December 2021

Since the 1990s and especially since the mid-2000s, China has been implementing the largest social policy project in its history, subject to limited attention from the West. Although Chinese social policy is largely based on its own traditions, its emergence and expansion have been influenced by international interdependencies of various origins. The project's central question is the following: How have these internal and external influences affected and shaped Chinese social policy and which mechanisms were involved? The period under review covers the years between 1990 and 2020.

The first phase of the project has two aims: Firstly, a comprehensive reconstruction of the developmental dynamics in the three important policy fields of old-age provision, healthcare and unemployment insurance will be conducted. Secondly, we will explain the different dynamics in these fields by identifying the interplay of international and national influencing factors that are responsible for the variance in spread, degree of inclusion and generosity. Here we will examine the mechanisms by which international interdependencies affect the national development of social policy, in particular the evolution of ideas and the choice of models and programmes. The project will combine insights from the literature on diffusion with institutionalist policy analysis. The case studies will be analysed using a method mix comprising process tracing and quantitative techniques. While we will collect data from Chinese databases and interviews with experts, we will also evaluate archive material and conduct a content analysis of secondary literature. Our findings should lead to a greater understanding of this case of an expansion of social policy under autocratic conditions, which is of particular interest for international comparisons.

In the second phase we will, among other questions, investigate whether the current reforms of the hukou system, which disadvantages the rural population, are leading to an alignment of rural and urban social security systems. We will also assess how internal and external factors interact in the re-

cently locally tested long-term care insurance. In this context, we will take a comparative look at the East Asian region, since long-term care insurance has already been introduced (Japan, South Korea) or tested (Taiwan) there. Finally, we ask in a "South-South" perspective whether China's social policy is a role model for other countries of the Global South.

Rollenwandel und Rollenkontestationsprozesse in der VR China: Globalisierung "chinesischer" Ordnungskonzeptionen?

Principal Investigator

Funded by Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (DFG), Projektnummer 238920157, 2020–2023

Das Forschungsprojekt beleuchtet die globalen Implikationen, die aus den institutionellen Reformen und der Neuausrichtung des chinesischen Entwicklungswege seit 2013 resultieren. Bei der Re-Kalibrierung des chinesischen Partei-Staates werden – wie die Auswertung der innerchinesischen Debatten zu Governance-Formen und Entwicklungswegen (2002–2017)

gezeigt hat – Veränderungen des globalen Handlungsumfeldes reflektiert und mögliche Spill-Over-Effekte auf die VR China kalkuliert. Zugleich aber impliziert die verstärkte globale Präsenz der VR China und ihre neue Wirtschaftsstärke, dass chinesische Governance-Konzeptionen einen Einfluss auf die Reform der internationalen Institutionenordnung gewinnen könnten. Die „Neue Seidenstraßen“-Initiative ist nur ein Beispiel, wie nationale Entwicklungsmodelle der VR China auf regionale und globale Räume umgeschrieben werden. Innerhalb der VR China liegen zahlreiche konkurrierende Konzeptionen von politischer Herrschaft, Ordnungsprinzipien und Chinas globaler Rolle vor, die unter den Fraktionen innerhalb der Kommunistischen Partei wie auch den zahlreichen epistemischen Gemeinschaften kontrovers debattiert werden. Chinas offizielles nationales Rollenset durchläuft eine umfassende Rekonfiguration. Untersuchungen zu dem Phänomen der Rollenkontestation haben sich bislang primär auf demokratisch-pluralistische Systeme konzentriert. Rollenkontestationsprozesse in modernen Autokratien sind weiterhin untertheoretisiert; die Rekonfiguration des offiziellen Rollensets der VR China und der damit verbundenen Konzepte Identität und (globaler) Status ist noch nicht umfassend systematisch aufgearbeitet worden.

Das Forschungsprojekt möchte diese Lücke schließen. Hierzu sollen vertikale und horizontale Rollenkontestationsprozesse und die Rekalibrierung des offiziellen nationalen Rollensets der VR China unter Berücksichtigung der (Rollen-)Interaktionen mit zentralen anderen Staaten untersucht werden. Änderungen hinsichtlich offizieller Rollenansprüche oder Modifikationen hinsichtlich der strategischen globalen Positionierung eines Akteurs müssen nicht – wie die Forschung zu Rollenkontestationsprozessen in demokratisch-pluralistischen Systemen gezeigt hat – aus globalen Strukturveränderungen resultieren. Vielmehr können diese auch Paradigmenwechsel und die partielle Substituierung von Leitideen im nationalen Kontext abbilden. Dies hat unmittelbare Implikationen für den Bereich der Politikanalyse und Politikberatung: Eine systematische theoriebasierte Analyse der Rollenkontestationsprozesse der VR China wird vor diesem Hintergrund zu einer unverzichtbaren Grundlage für die Bestimmung der treibenden Kräfte und Determinanten hinter den offiziellen Rollenansprüchen der VR China und ihrer strategischen Positionierung in bilateralen Interaktionen und auf weltpolitischer Ebene.

IBRAHIM ÖZTÜRK

The Belt and Road Initiative as a Hybrid International Public Good (IPG)

Current research

This research is on the institutional quality of BRI as a newly evolving governance platform with IPG characteristics to stimulate global cooperation in infrastructure development across the Eurasian landmass, the heartland of the emerging multiplex world. With an interdisciplinary perspective, the research employs Agency and Institutional Economic theories to address potential principal-agent controversies and therefore resulting collective action problems. They must be minimised in a way that BRI could successfully address both the conflicting as well as overlapping demands and supply conditions of a needed hybrid IPG, which requires an effective amalgamation between the Western experience of public good creation in the post-WW2 and China's indigenous values. These qualities of BRI are questioned in the specific context of Central Asia that takes place along its critical West-Asian economic corridor.

WERNER PASCHA

Current Issues of the Political Economies of Japan and Korea: Comparative Research

Funded by the Bertelsmann Foundation, 2009–2021

Werner Pascha is contributing to projects of the Bertelsmann Foundation that promise stringent comparisons between various countries, based on a rigorous and detailed analytical framework. As for Japan, the framework is given by the *Sustainable Governance Indicators* (SGI) project. It analyzes and compares the need for reform in OECD member countries, as well as their ability to respond to current social and political challenges. The project is designed to create a comprehensive data pool on government-related activities in the world's developed, free-market democracies. With respect to South Korea, the framework is the *Comparative Crisis Management* project of Bertelsmann Foundation which intends to evaluate the capacities and abilities of the political management in selected developing and transition countries in response to the global financial and economic crisis. In 2018 it was agreed to extend the work on SGI reports on Japan until 2021.

WERNER PASCHA, DIANA SCHÜLER AND MIHAELA SUHALITCA

together with a team from Chungnam National University, Daejeon (Rep. of Korea)

Regional Differences of Entrepreneurial Ecosystems in South Korea and Germany

Funded by DAAD and Korea Research Foundation, 03/2018–2019, ongoing

This is a comparative study of the relationship between regional differences and creating entrepreneurship on a local level in Germany and (South) Korea. The joint project aims to explore the distinct features of entrepreneurial ecosystems in different regions and the influence on startup activities. The project includes two field studies in Korea by the German team and two more field trips by the Korean team to Germany. Publication of several papers is ongoing.

WERNER PASCHA

The Current Wave of Infrastructure Initiatives, Focussing on the Role of Japan

Own funds, from 2018

There is a lot of interest on the Chinese Belt and Road Initiative due to its economic weight and political as well as geo-strategic repercussions. At the same time, BRI is not the only initiative in this field. Rather, BRI should be seen in the context of other national and multilateral schemes. For instance, the reforms of BRI that were announced during the Second BRI Forum in 2019 can only be understood when taking the dynamism of various parallel developments into consideration. The current project covers this perspective. As for national approaches, the project focuses on Japan, whose "Partnership for Quality Infrastructure" of 2015/16 is a reaction to BRI, but also reflects on earlier Japanese initiatives, at least going back to the 1990s. On the multilateral level, mechanisms like G7, G20 and OECD have taken up the idea of "quality infrastructure". The project has led to various articles on different aspects of the topic.

GIULIA ROMANO

"Community Governance" with Chinese characteristics?: Learning from Abroad and Innovating for Elderly Care in China

Project supported by the UDE programme *Programm zur Förderung des exzellenten wissenschaftlichen Nachwuchses*

Focusing on the use and translation of concepts such as "community governance" (*shequ zhili*) and "community care", this research project looks at the innovation and/or re-elaborations of existing policies and approaches at city level to respond to the daunting challenge of population ageing in China. Since the mid-2000s, Chinese cities are exploring suitable and possibly viable ways to deal with their ageing populations, and particularly with their most vulnerable groups, mostly based on self-help and on encouraging volunteers support. Such solutions also make great use of new digital technologies, with the scope of making administrative intervention more efficient, prompt and ad hoc. At this early stage, the aim of this project is that of exploring the "recontextualization" of the concepts of "community governance" and "community care", by exploring the origins and meanings associated to them in their original place of development, and by analysing how

Chinese scholars have discussed this concept and how it has been framed in official policy discourse. This research step is fundamental for the development of a second research phase that looks at policy translation through focusing on the implementation and the concrete practices developed at grassroots administrative level (the "street offices" – *jiedao* – and their "branches", the resident committees and communities – *ju-weiyuanhui* and *shequ*).

HELMUT SCHNEIDER

Environmental Conflicts in Southeast Asia

Current research

In this research environmental conflicts are defined as conflicts in which environment or single natural elements (e.g. water, land) play a crucial role. That does not necessarily mean that such conflicts are also caused by e.g. environmental degradation (although sometimes this might be the case). It is assumed that environmental conflicts, as conflicts in general, can only be understood and solved, when their (social, cultural, economic and political) context is considered properly. A basic hypothesis is that environment and natural elements, as a rule, are functioning as threat multipliers rather than single causes of conflicts. And they do so in very different ways. Due to the already noticeable, more so the predicted effects of climate change and a growing interest of financial investors for natural resources, it is assumed that environmental conflicts in Southeast Asia will increase in the future in terms of numbers as well as degree.

HELMUT SCHNEIDER

Geopolitics of the Chinese Belt and Road Initiative

Current research

The Chinese Belt and Road Initiative was launched in a period of rapid change of the global world order. Globalization has slowed down since the financial crisis of 2008 and the hegemonic position of the United States has weakened significantly. At the same time the growing global political weight of the PR of China can be observed. When a hegemonic regime is declining and a new one is not yet implemented, the world is entering a period of growing rivalry of regional powers, each trying to control their zones of influence: The control of (smaller) territories is gaining importance over the control of flows and networks, and the probability of territorial conflicts is growing. In

science and in politics geopolitics is back on the agenda. The geopolitical research questions are: Will the Chinese BRI in the present period of rapid change of the global world order help to produce and guarantee much needed global public goods like the freedom and safety of trade, travel and communication, the safety of investments, the rule of law, a stable global financial system? Or will it, as part of a national imperial strategy, add further to global rivalry and conflict (like e.g. the conflict in the South China Sea)?

HELMUT SCHNEIDER

Geography of Urban Property Markets

Current research

Urban property markets are more and more in the focus of financial investors. The links between the financial economy and the property markets imply many risks for the whole economy on all spatial scales as the latest example of the financial crisis of 2008 has shown. On the other hand access to affordable housing is a growing problem not only in less developed countries but also in the developed world, a problem that is intensified by the financialisation of the economy. Both, the financialisation of urban property markets as well as the growing housing problem unfold on different spatial scales. Urban and economic geography have a set of theoretical and methodological approaches and tools to offer for analysing the heterogenous dynamics of urban property markets. The research focus is especially on the links between different spatial scales affecting those dynamics. A special focus is on Düsseldorf and the former industrial and workers quarter of Oberbilk.

DIANA SCHÜLER

The Relationship between Entrepreneurship and Unemployment: Evidence from South Korea

Current research

As a complementary research project to her dissertation about entrepreneurship in South Korea, Diana Schüler explores the causality between entrepreneurship and unemployment in South Korea. This relationship has been widely studied in Western developed economies, and evidence for both the refugee and the entrepreneurial effect has been found. The purpose of this project is to expand the empirical literature by examining the relationship between entrepreneurship and unemployment in the

South Korean context via a time-series analysis. Two different measures for entrepreneurship, namely self-employment and newly established corporations, are used.

The grant funds follow-up activities from a workshop, initiated by the DFG and organized on their behalf by Karen Shire and Verena Blechinger-Talcott (FU Berlin) in Tokyo, November 13–15, 2017 on *Social Science Contributions to Contemporary Social and Political Changes in Germany and Japan*. The follow-up research collaboration aims to deepen two dimensions of cooperation between German and Japanese sociologists.

Karen Shire was appointed to a residence fellowship in this group, and joined workshops at ZIF in October 2017 and June 2018, co-organized a workshop for the group in April 2018, and participated in the final workshop of the group in February 2019. survey program researchers in Berlin, and with the Deutsches Zentrum für Integration- und Migrationsforschung (DeZIM) in Berlin to discuss research cooperation. A workshop was also held at the UDE with migration researchers, to exchange state of the arts with the idea of a broader cooperation (the workshop was joined by Helen Baykara-Krumme, Anja Weiss, Marcel Erlinghagen, Stephan Scheel, and their associated research assistants, as well as by IN-EAST scholar Florian Coulmas). A joint research workshop was planned with co-funding by both the Waseda University Graduate School of Asia-Pacific Studies and Keio University in March 2020 to finalize a program of comparative research on employment patterns of migrants in Germany and Japan. The workshop was canceled due to the pandemic. This event would have provided the opportunity to meet with key researchers at the Japan Institute of Labor, who have conducted surveys which can be matched to the IAB surveys. It would have also provided Karen Shire a chance to meet personally with the Deans and Research officers at Keio University, whose cooperation is needed for joint research programs. PI Karen Shire planned month-long research residency at the Waseda University Graduate School of Asia-Pacific Studies in March 2020 to work on joint research proposals, especially one for an international research training group. Again, this visit would have provided the essential opportunities to meet with the Dean of the Graduate School of Asia-Pacific Studies and research officers, whose assent for a grant is necessary. Karen Shire was invited as a visiting fellow to the Graduate School for this purpose. Also, this activity was canceled due to the pandemic. With all travel canceled at the critical stage of negotiating with university officials and grant-writing with cooperation partners, we applied for an extension and rededication of the DFG funds to allow for Aimi Muranaka to coordinate and support grant-writing virtually from Duisburg. A proposal for joint research is now being prepared by Aimi Muranaka and Karen Shire with Prof. Hirohisa Takenoshita and Gracia Liu-Farrer. This has been enabled by an extension to the grant by the DFG until the end of December 2020 (due to disruptions in plans caused by the pandemic). While we will have completed the necessary preparation for submitting a grant on the German side, the actual submission of joint grants is postponed until travel and meetings in Tokyo are again possible.

KAREN SHIRE

Host for and Joint Research with Prof. Sylvia Walby,

University of Lancaster, winner of Anne- lieise Maier Research Award by Alexander von Humboldt Foundation, 2018–2023

The award was made on the basis of the nomination submitted by Karen Shire. She is Sylvia Walby's host, together with the Institute of Sociology (IfS) and the Essen College for Gender Research (EKfG). In 2019–2020 Karen Shire and Sylvia Walby published a special issue of *Social Politics* with seven contributions from a workshop organized in June 2019. Cosmopolitan Publics in Isolation: Japanese Global Sixties in between the First and the Third World

Current research

This is a book project on the historical sociology of the Japanese global sixties movement. By situating Japanese sixties movements in between the First and the Third World binary, the project explores the ways in which the Japanese movements became global by overcoming structural and cultural constraints for transnational network building. The project introduces the original concept of cosmopolitan publics and analyzes the transnational communication be-

tween the Japanese and the First and the Third World activists. In conclusion, it argues that globality was, in fact, the crucial factor for the cultural change of "1968 revolution," especially in the case of Japan, for the civil society to transform its political culture to focus on race, diversity, and Asia.

MARKUS TAUBE

The Institutional Foundations of Innovation in China

Current research

In recent years, innovation research has clearly shown that innovation-driven economic development relies on a broad foundation of benign cultural, social, political, and economic framework conditions. Institutions based in various social regimes must incentivize innovation creating behavior as well as the acceptance and diffusion of these very innovations in society. There exists no "one-fits-all" institutional set-up outlining the preconditions for successful innovation-driven development. Cultural idiosyncrasies, variations in the availability and costs of specific resources and competencies, specific goals of ruling elites etc. all lead to specific manifestations and combinations of institutions that in their totality promote innovation in varying intensity and on differing social and technological trajectories.

Against this background, China constitutes a highly interesting case study for the analysis of the institutional requirements as well as evolutionary genesis of innovation-driven economic development in a large non-Western society. After three decades of highly successful catching-up economic development based on the emulation of foreign institutions, business models and technologies, the Chinese economy has now reached a stage where it needs to foster more endogenous innovation in order to evade (relative) stagnation in what has become known as the "middle income trap". This requires substantial alterations not only in the structural set-up and incentive systems governing the Chinese economy, but also in the fabric and underlying norms and values structuring society as well as the self-understanding of the political elite and its organization of political processes. The Chinese business sector is already responding to the need for more endogenous innovation in all sectors and segments of the economy. By doing so, it is exerting pressure for changes in the social fabric. At the same time Chinese government and the Chinese Communist Party appear to be highly committed to transforming the economic system and promoting an innovation-friendly institutional set-up – while upholding an unwavering claim to power. The Hayekian postulate according to which only free (democratic and market-based) societies can feature dynamic, innovation-driven development dynamics instantly comes to one's mind as a "belief" of Western institutionalism and "Ordnungspolitik" that needs to be reflected upon in the Chinese context.

MARKUS TAUBE

The Chinese State-Business Nexus

Current research

When China joined the WTO in December 2001, it agreed that other countries, notably the European Union (EU) could continue to treat it as a "non-market economy" for the purposes of trade defense measures. The background to this special arrangement lay in the fact that at the turn of the century the Chinese economy was still in transition from a centrally planned economy to a market economy based on scarcity prices and free competition. There neither existed a comprehensive set of institutions that could support comprehensive market exchanges in the economy, nor was the government willing and give up its claim to directly steer economic development of the economy, its sectors as well as its major firms.

In expectation of substantial progress of China's transition towards a full-fledged market economy in the coming years, the Protocol of Accession of China to the WTO outlined that 15 years after its accession China's status might be upgraded to a "market economy". While China interpreted the wording of these paragraphs as guaranteeing it an automatic transition to "market economy" status, the EU upheld the position that China would have to demonstrate that it complies with the five criteria defining the "market economy" status. With all economic observers agreeing, that China did not fulfil these criteria (by a wide margin) at the end of 2016, the dispute focused on juridical exchanges on the existence of a guarantee or not. Eventually, the dispute was solved with some diplomatic genius that neither awarded China the status of a "market economy", nor inflicted a massive loss of face to one of Europe's most important trade partners and thereby might have provoked an open trade war. The solution found is to completely give up the differentiation between "market" and "non-market" economies – not only with regard to China, but all economies. Instead, for all trade defense measures the normal reference value will be the domestic prices. However, if significant distortions (e.g. caused by state inter-

ferences) affecting domestic prices can be shown to prevail, international benchmark prices can be used instead. In order to make this new mechanism operational, the European Commission is going to publish specific reports identifying such distortions in an economy-wide or specific sector level. EU manufacturers can then refer to these reports in order to determine the basis for complaints and to calculate what the normal reference prices should be.

Research is being conducted in order to assess the degree to which Chinese industries are operating according to competition-based market standards or are subjected to market-distorting governmental interventions.

MARKUS TAUBE

Economic implications of the "Belt and Road Initiative"

Current research

A major impulse for economic development in the Eurasian continent as well as a restructuring of the global division of labour might be created with the unfolding of what has become known as the "One Belt, One Road" or "Belt and Road" initiative. Proposed by Chinese government in 2013 the initiative aims at creating a comprehensive network of transport corridors and an integrated industrial fabric spanning from China via the Middle East and Central Asia to Europe. In the course of this multilateral industrialization programme new regional and multilateral institutions that complement or compete with existing regional/global governance systems can be expected to evolve. Their shape as well as the concrete impact of the potentially emerging new regional value chains on global goods flows, investment activity, local as well as international labour markets, local and supra-national institution building, however, remains undetermined. The disruptive changes brought up by the "Belt and Road" initiative cannot result in a win-win for all parties, but will entail some a reorganization of absolute and relative wealth, income generation possibilities and economic as well as political power projection capacity. New research initiatives are required to better understand the parameters at play and identify potential local/regional/global development patterns.

JENS WRONA

Principal investigator together with 9 other professors from UDE, RUB, TU Dortmund, and University of Münster

Regional Disparities and Economic Policy

Research Training Group 2484, funded by German Research Foundation (DFG), 10/2019–03/2024

The overarching goal of the RTG "Regional Disparities and Economic Policy" is to provide an outstanding education for doctoral students while at the same time contributing to frontier research in the exciting and dynamic field of regional economics. Combining the expertise of scholars from distinct economic backgrounds (e.g. labor, public, macro) and thus different methodological skills, institutional knowledge, and data access, we establish a graduate program that promises internationally visible scientific output and an excellent academic training environment for PhD candidates.

Research Agenda

Regional disparities – for example with respect to income, housing costs, labor market, education and health outcomes – are pronounced, persistent, and at times divergent, but the debate about their origins, consequences, and appropriate policy responses is still largely unresolved. The RTG "Regional Disparities and Economic Policy" aims to improve our knowledge of underlying economic mechanisms and hence lay the groundwork for well-founded policy recommendations by applying and further developing recent methodological advances in regional economics as well as utilizing unique data sets. To this end, the Research Data Center at RWI – Leibniz-Institute for Economic Research, specialized on regional data, constitutes an important partner of the RTG.

Qualification Program

The RTG "Regional Disparities and Economic Policy" provides doctoral students with an excellent environment for a completion of high-quality dissertations in its research area. The comprehensive qualification program combines a short, concentrated course program with structured research guidance and ample opportunities for feedback and discussion, allowing for dissertation completion within three years and promoting careers in academia, research institutes, the private economy and the public sector, including international organizations.

The Group

The RTG brings together eight internationally visible professors from different sub-disciplines within economics (e.g. public economics, macroeconomics, labor economics, regional economics or health economics) who share a genuine interest in regional aspects of the economy and access to and expertise in handling highly relevant data sets: **Thomas Bauer** (Professor of Economics, Faculty of Management and Economics, Ruhr University Bochum), **Christiane Hellmanzik** (Professor of Urban, Regional and International Economics, TU Dortmund University), **Philip Jung** (Professor of Economics, TU Dortmund), **Martin Karlsson** (Professor of Economics, University of Duisburg-Essen), **Sanne Kruse-Becher** (Junior Professor of Macroeconomics, Ruhr Universität Bochum), **Marie Paul** (Professor for Quantitative Methods in Economics, Mercator School of Management (MSM), University of Duisburg-Essen), **Nadine Riedel** (Professor for Economic Policy and Regional Economics, Westfälische Wilhelms-Universität Münster), **Tobias Seidel** (Professor of Economics, Mercator School of Management (MSM), University of Duisburg-Essen), **Jens Wrona** (Professor for New Economic Geography and East Asia, Mercator School of Management and Institute of East Asian Studies, University of Duisburg-Essen), **Galina Zudenkova** (Professor of Public Finance, Faculty of Business and Economics, TU Dortmund).

Together with about seven incoming doctoral students each year they form the RTG group. An extensive personal and institutional research network and RTG activities geared to outgoing and incoming (guest) researchers place its research and qualification program in the center of the international research environment in the field. The combination of methodological and topical knowledge from different sub-fields makes this RTG unique.

4 LIBRARY REPORT BIBLIOTHEKSBERICHT

The library of the Institute of East Asian Studies is integrated as East Asia Collection in the University Library (UL), and therefore applies the UL's regulations for use, acquisition policy and budget requirements. However, the collection has its own location from D76 to D87 in the first floor of the branch library LK.

The collection reflects the contemporary relevance and interdisciplinary nature of East Asian Studies. The main collection areas are politics, economy, society, geography, modern history, culture and the modern languages of China, Japan and Korea. The Collection currently holds about 31,000 monographs and more than 500 periodicals including ongoing subscriptions. The total holdings of the East Asian Collection

are recorded in the networked electronic database of University Libraries of North Rhine-Westphalia and can be retrieved from the catalogue "Primo" of the UL (<http://primo.ub.uni-due.de/>).

The University Library has a number of subject-oriented databases. The subject area of East Asian Studies offers a constantly growing range of databases, reference works, portals and newspapers. These can be accessed via the homepage of the UL under the menu items "databases / in subject order / Ostasiawissenschaften".

Since the IN-EAST has a license agreement with the Berlin State Library, students and members of our institute may use the shared licensed databases from East Asia via CrossAsia, the virtual portal of the Asian

studies. User registration is recommended to use the full range of CrossAsia services (<https://crossasia.org>).

Blauer Leihverkehr (Blue Loan Service) is a special form of interlibrary loan, which provides direct delivery of literature in original languages. It is based on a loan agreement between East, Southeast and Central Asian research institutes and the East Asia Department of the Berlin State Library, to which our institute is affiliated. Institute members may obtain original East Asian literature through the electronic order form (<https://crossasia.org/en/service/blauer-leihverkehr/>).




